But to do it in such style was a real bonus.

And oh, what style we were treated to as Dancing Feet Academy took us on a World Tour. We fastened our seatbelts (as we were instructed to do) and travelled first class all the way. The show started like a glitzy MGM musical: slinky scarlet sequin clad dancers strutting down the steps, with red plumes perched in their hair, issuing the invitation to... Come Fly With Me. What an opening number. From there our cruise liner (jaw dropping backdrop by Dave Wyeth) took us from Austria, through Spain, Thailand, India, onwards to Paris, Mexico and beyond. Forget the geography lesson - this was showtime. We danced with the captain (stylish Pete Stagg) went under the sea (loved the bubble machine), did a manic Mexican wave (those lads are hilarious) and eventually ended up (where else?) but in London for a truly rousing rendition of The Lambeth Walk (who sewed on all those buttons for the fabulous Pearly royalty?)
