MOST amateur productions have their strengths be it snazzy costumes, professional-looking lighting, entertaining choreography or dancers that exhibit marvellous energy. This one, I have to say, had it all. Dance principal Nadine Morrish and her team can only be applauded for getting students to such an exemplary standard of performance. This was an impressive, dazzling and entertaining show.

Not a single dancer cast a nervous look at anyone else's feet, not one was unsure of where they needed to be on stage and not one had forgotten that their job was to smile, project and entertain.

Instead each, (and this is quite an incredible achievement seeing there were at least 160 of them ranging in age from four to 77), was a sure-footed, confident, enthusiastic star in their own right.

This was a wonderful show. The lower school and the juniors were tight in their routines and performed so confidently they were a joy to watch. The whole effect of the interweaving choreography was impressive but if you looked at each dancer in isolation they each gave 100 per cent. There's no doubt in my mind that every single student who attends this dance school is a dancer and performer, no matter which level they've achieved in their exams and studies. Posture, poise and presence couldn't be faulted. The troop of boys was great too - powerfully energetic and funky.

As for the senior girls - wow didn't they look gorgeous (all those wonderful costumes) as they moved from graceful and beautiful to sassy and sexy in a variety of super-tight numbers showcasing topnotch agility, flexibility and stage presence.
